COVID 19 UPDATE:

I know we all follow this closely, but picking here and there I find some interesting stats: U.S. deaths per 100,000 = 6 in Italy its 32. The unbelieveable exponential growth in infected people in the U.S.- 2/26 = 15 cases; 3/16 = 4,226 cases; 4/11 = 500,000 + cases + itis estimated another 100,000 to 200,000 cases of asymptomatic carriers. Nursing home deaths attributed to the virus have exploded to more than 3,300. This figure is likely much higher as many states, like Florida do not report nursing home deaths. And, lastly, the unfortunate prisoners in our jails across the country. Unlike the cruise ships where eventually everyone can disembark, not so with the prisons- Cook County Jail in Chicago-492 cases (prisoners and staff) about 10 % of the population-tragic,

DON'T CRY FOR ME ARGENTINA:

Or, actually, I meant to say, Panama, Liberia, Norway and Bermuda, home countries for the vast majority of Cruise Line companies which had all been hoping for goodies from the stimulus program. Examples: Carnival in 2019 paid \$71 million in U.S. taxes on \$20.8Billion in revenues. Caribbean paid \$36 Million on almost \$11 Billion in revenues- a pittance. WHERE WERE YOU APRIL 13, 1970?

Wow!! Just caught up with this article on Apollo 13. I had forgotten much of it and some of our readers may have never heard of it.

Apollo 13 was to have been our third mission to the moon. The crew was lunar module pilot, Fred Haise, Command module pilot, John Swigert and Mission commander, James Lovell. Having blasted off on April 11th all was going according to plan when suddenly there was an explosion followed by Swigert's famous and rather calm words, "Houston, we've had a problem here." Two of the three fuel cells were fatally damaged. James Lovell would later say, "Now it was strictly a case of survival." The crew might not be able to get home.

There ensued a number of serious issues, all of which they were able to overcome with the help of Houston. The two biggest issues, however, were still ahead of them. They quickly realized they would have to jettison the command module and that all three men would have to get in the lunar module, made to accommodate only two. Further, the lunar module (LEM) had life support for only 45 hours (the planned time to land on the moon

and get back to the command module. Now the LEM would have to be their "lifeboat" and for twice as long. The last and scariest part of the mission was that the LEM would circle the moon and benefit from gravitational forces that would propel it back toward earth. This was unbelievably dicey. If they came back toward the earth at too steep an angle they would burn up when they hit the atmosphere. If the angle were too thin, the LEM would bounce off the atmosphere and they would be lost in space forever. Miraculously, they made it. Trus American heroes. As they say, "The real deal." Happy fiftieth. A movie was mad in 1995. You might want to check it out.

THE CROZIER AFFAIR:

Back to the issue of Captain Crozier. An investigation continues, but it is being reported that Captain Crozier's superiors were balking at his insistence that he had to evacuate the ship. With more and more of the crew getting ill, the Captain felt he had to release the letter which got leaked to the press. A number of the most senior officers on the ship asked to also be signatories on the

letter, but the Captain turned them down realizing the letter had the potential to damage careers. Today 584 crew members, including Captain Crozier, have the virus and one has died. 345,000 people have signed a petition to have Captain Crozier reinstated. Ex Acting Secretary Modly's 8,000 mile trip to diss the troops for having cheered Captain Crozier when he left the ship cost the tax payer \$243,000. Stay tuned.

POTENTIAL PROBLEMS FOR JOE BIDEN:
